

## THE THEME OF THE PSALMS

#### THE PSALMS ARE A SERIES OF DEVOTIONAL SONGS DESIGNED TO INSTRUCT MAN CONCERNING THE TWO CHOICES IN LIFE:

1.

To live one's life pleasing to the Lord.

#### **KEY WORDS**

Righteous/ness(120 times) Hear/Obey (65 times) Save/Salvation (80 times) Praise (4 words 158 times) Mercy (93 times) 2.

To live one's life pleasing self.

#### KEY WORDS


Wicked/ness (77 times) Enemy (70 times)

#### KEY ELEMENTS

Soul (132 times) Heart (128 times) Face (36 times) Eye (54 times)

<u>Psalm 1</u> sets the stage for the entire group of Psalms. It clearly lets all mankind know they will have to answer to the Lord (732 times). It ends with the thematic phrase: For the Lord knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish.

## DIDACTIC PSALMS

- I. THEY ARE GENERALLY DIRECTED TOWARD MAN (RATHER THAN TO GOD) FOR PURPOSES OF EDIFICATION.
- II. TOPICS TREATED IN DIDACTIC PSALMS:
  - A. KNOWLEDGE (19, 119) AND FEAR (112, 128) OF THE LORD COUPLED WITH OBEDIENCE
  - B. CONTRAST BETWEEN RIGHTEOUS AND WICKED (1, 14, 36).
  - C. TRUST IN GOD (49, 91).
  - D. JUSTICE IN SOCIETY (52, 82).
  - E. BROTHERHOOD AMONG MEN (127, 133).

#### I. <u>AN INTRODUCTION</u> - WHICH INVITED PEOPLE TO COME AND PRAISE THE WORTHY GOD. THE INVITATION MIGHT BE OFFERED TO:

- A. THE CONGREGATION IN THE SANCTUARY,
- B. TO CHOIRS or
- C. TO SOME PERSON OR GROUP.
- II. <u>A MAIN SECTION</u> GIVING THE GROUNDS FOR PRAISE:
  - A. GOD'S GREAT ATTRIBUTES,
  - B. HIS HOLY WORD,
  - C. HIS VIRTUES (SUCH AS HIS LOVINGKINDNESS AND COMPASSION) or
  - D. HIS MIGHTY ACTS (SUCH AS HIS SALVATION ON BEHALF OF ISRAEL OR HIS GREAT WORK IN CREATION).
- III. <u>A CONCLUSION</u> WHICH REPEATS WHY THIS PSALM OF PRAISE WAS A WORTHY AND LOGICAL THING TO DO.



## PSALMS OF THANKSGIVING

THESE WERE NORMALLY A PART OF FORMAL WORSHIP. THEY WERE USUALLY OFFERED BY A PERSON WHO RECEIVED SOME SPECIFIC BLESSING FROM GOD AND WHO IS NOW COMING TO THE SANCTUARY TO OFFER THANKS, PROBABLY WITH RELATIVES AND FRIENDS.

THIS TYPE OF PSALM WOULD USUALLY HAVE THE FOLLOWING ELEMENTS:

- I. <u>AN INTRODUCTION</u> IN WHICH THE PERSON ACKNOWLEDGED THAT HE / SHE HAS SUFFERED IN THE PAST OR HAS HAD GENERAL MISFORTUNE.
- II. <u>A DISCUSSION OF WHY HE IS NOW BEFORE GOD PRAISING HIM</u> -HE HAS DELIVERED ME.
- III. <u>A CONCLUDING WORD OF PRAISE</u> BECAUSE OF HIS CARE AND LOVE FOR ME I RECOGNIZE THE HAND OF GOD IN MY LIFE.

#### EXAMPLES

INDIVIDUAL (30, 34, 40, 52, 66, 92, 116, 138). COMMUNAL (65, 67, 107, 118, 124).



THIS PARTICULAR STYLE IS FELT TO BE THE MOST COMMON IN THE PSALMS

> THE INDIVIDUAL LAMENT HAS THE FOLLOWING ELEMENTS OR FORM:

\* \* \* \*

- 1. An initial calling upon the Lord;
- 2. A complaint, specifying the occasion giving rise to the lament;
- 3. A prayer requesting the Lord to hear and respond with respect to the source of the lament;
- 4. The expression of wishes or desires concerning the fate of friends or enemies;
- 5. The grounds upon which the appeal to God is based; and
- 6. A concluding expression of confidence that the appeal will be heard and responded to by God.

Examples: Psalms 13, 17, 51, 73.



#### **A STUDY IN THE PSALMS**

#### THIS PARTICULAR TYPE OF PSALM WAS USED TO SHOW GENUINE TRUST IN THE LORD \* \* \* \*

#### THE TRUST PSALM HAS THE FOLLOWING ELEMENTS OR FORM:

- 1. An expression of anxiety: 3:1-2
- 2. An expression of confidence: 3:3-4
- 3. The reaction to or the result of that confidence, which would be either:
  - a. A feeling of peace; and
  - b. A feeling of contentment. For example, in Psalm 3 it is sleep. No tossing and turning; 3:5-6
- 4. Often reflect on God's deliverance in times past: 3:7-8

## Examples: Psalms 3, 4, 5, 16, 23

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#### Psalm 23

There are many texts of scripture that are well known. Some texts are well known usually because of the deep and powerful meaning that is found within them. Other texts of scripture are well known because of the wonderful application that they have in today's society. They are found in movies and books alike. One of the most quoted books is that of Psalms. The Psalms contain a great source of comfort and knowledge that is useful for today. One of the most well-known of these is Psalm 23. This Psalm has both a deep meaning and a wonderful application.

The 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm is under the classification of a trust Psalm. It is one of the many Psalms which were written by David. This Psalm is known by some to be "The Pearl of Psalms" (Cloer 298). This is likely because of its popularity and subject matter. The essence of this Psalm is a trust in the Lord. It talks about a man and how he lives his life with God (298). It portrays this idea by using the illustration of the Lord being a shepherd. Studying the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm can aid us in growing our trust in the Lord. In this study, there will be a thorough breakdown of Psalm 23. This breakdown will help one to better understand what the Lord does for people and how they should trust in Him. The 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm portrays six main characteristics of the Lord as our shepherd.

The first characteristic of the Lord that is portrayed is that He is our shepherd. This is the starting point of the Psalm. The first verse states, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want" (Psalm 23:1). The word Lord is the tetragrammaton name for God. God's personal name, "Yahweh" shows His covenant love towards the believer in the Psalm. This name for God simply shows how much care He has for this believer. The next part of the verse is that the Lord is his shepherd.

The Lord being his shepherd shows many points about the characteristic of God. This phrase shows right off the bat that there is a relationship between the believer and the Lord. This relationship is one that is deep and still productive. Both the believer and the Lord have a part in this relationship. They each have to continue working at it for the relationship to last (Keller 17).

A shepherd is a person who herds and takes care of sheep. The Lord is taking care of this believer. A shepherd is one who will do anything to keep his sheep safe. There is a level of total commitment to the sheep on the shepherd's behalf. By looking at this phrase another way, one can understand that a shepherd lives with his flock. A shepherd is everything to his flock. The believer in this Psalm sees the Lord as everything; God is above all else (Kidner 110). God's family is in a living relationship with Him in which He watches over His family completely.

The second phrase in verse one states, "I shall not want" (Psalm 23:1). This phrase can seem confusing when read through quickly. Why would someone want to deny the Lord as his or her shepherd? However, this phrase is connected with the first part of the verse. It is merely stating that because the Lord is his shepherd, he should not worry (Hembree 4). By using the word "worry," one can see the connection between the two phrases. The believer does not need to worry about anything. To connect it back to the word "want," one could say that because the Lord is his shepherd he could not want anything more or extra. However, this is not the only characteristic of the Lord that is portrayed.

The second characteristic of the Lord that is portrayed is that the Lord is a comforter. This characteristic is shown in verse two which states, "He makes me lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside quiet waters" (Psalm 23:2). This verse continues with the illustration of a shepherd. A shepherd has many responsibilities when it comes to his sheep. One of these responsibilities is to ensure that the sheep had fresh grass upon which to graze. This shepherd is making sure that the sheep are comfortable and have everything they need to stay healthy. The

Lord is making the believer lie down in green pastures. Green pastures are those which have luscious green grass all over the place. They are the top of the line when it comes to pastures. The Lord is going to make sure that the believer has the very best quality of life as possible. This is showing how the Lord is ensuring that the believer is comfortable and has an infinite supply of food (Cloer 300). The Lord is taking care of the believer.

This verse continues with the phrase "He leads me beside quiet waters." The Lord is leading the believer next to these "quiet waters." The phrase "quiet waters" can have two possible meanings which both still apply. The first is that sheep will not drink from rushing or moving waters. They are terrified of this kind of water and will blatantly refuse to drink (Hembree 5). This being said, they need to be led by the shepherd to waters that are not going to keep the sheep from drinking. These waters need to be still so that the sheep feel at ease and can drink from it. When applied to the Lord, He is one who makes sure that the believer is comforted by being led to calmer areas. The believer's life is going to be taken care of. The Lord is the great comforter in that He makes sure that the believer can rely on Him to keep him out of the rough waters.

The other possible meaning of the phrase "quiet waters" is that sheep need to drink. If sheep get thirsty enough, they will wonder off and seek out water to drink. Sometimes they will find water that has been churned up for one reason or another. These waters are no longer pure because the sediment has been mixed in with it. The shepherd leads his sheep next to waters that are not churned up with sediment or filled with other items. These waters have had time to let the dirt and grime settle to the bottom leaving only the best water at the top (Keller 49). When applied to verse 2, the Lord is going to make sure that the believer is going to be next to the best of the best. The believer is in the ultimate area of comfort and bliss because of the Lord as his shepherd and comforter. No matter what interpretation one takes, the Lord is going to take care of and meet every need of the believer. However, there is another characteristic of the Lord as shepherd that is portrayed.

The third characteristic of the Lord that is portrayed is that He is a guide. This characteristic is found in verse three which states, "He restores my soul; He guides me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake" (Psalm 23:3). The first phrase about restoring the soul can also be related to sheep. Every now and again, a sheep will go astray and break away from everyone else. This sheep sometimes will begin to wander into an area where there are predators. The sheep's life is in danger. The shepherd has a responsibility to make sure that all the sheep stay together. The shepherd would bring this wandering sheep back, and in essence save its life from the surrounding predators.

There will be times when the believer will stray away from the Lord. The Lord as his shepherd brings him back safely which restores his soul. The Lord will guide the believer in the paths of righteousness just as a shepherd does his sheep. The Lord does this because the believer is His. He does it "for His name's sake." The Lord is there to guide the believer the right way the entire time. This shows how the Lord is a guide. This shows the Lord's third characteristic as a shepherd.

The fourth characteristic of the Lord that is portrayed is that the Lord is a protector. This is shown in verse four which states, "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I fear no evil, for You are with me; Your rod and Your staff they comfort me" (Psalm 23:4). The believer at this point is walking through a place that would normally be scary and dangerous. Sheep have to sometimes be led through places that are dangerous and risky. The shepherd is there to make sure that all of the sheep remain safe throughout the trip. He can do this because he already knows what is going on and how to navigate through the hard places so that the sheep are protected (Young 62).

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A shepherd also holds a rod and a staff. Both of these were for the purpose of protecting the flock. The rod is a spear like object that would be used to fight off any predators that may try to come for the sheep. Also, the staff was a very long piece of wood with a hook on the end that fit perfectly around the necks of the sheep. This staff would be used to pull the sheep up or out of danger and back to safety (Keller 92).

The believer states that he does not have to be afraid of anything evil. He says that he may be going through a bad time, but he knows that the Lord will pull him out of any danger that may arise. The Lord is with him and is looking out for him as his protector. The believer finds comfort in the Lord's rod and staff. This is because he knows that these tools are used to ensure his safety. The Lord is the believer's protector, but there is another characteristic of the Lord that is found in addition to this.

The fifth characteristic of the Lord that is portrayed is that the Lord is a sanctuary. This characteristic is found in verse 5 which states, "You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; You have anointed my head with oil; My cup overflows" (Psalm 23:5). This shows how the believer is safe with the Lord.

When it comes to sheep, they sometimes have to stop and eat in places which are not the best choice for the shepherd. However, he has no choice, so he lets them stop and eat. He first prepares the ground by removing any poisonous plants that the sheep might eat. These sheep are eating in a place which is surrounded by predators that are watching and wanting to come get one of the sheep. Even though this is the case, the shepherd keeps the predators away in a way that the sheep do not notice or get startled (Cloer 302). They feel like they are in the best place ever because the shepherd is trying to make them feel that way.

The Lord has prepared a place for the believer on earth. Even though the believer may be in the midst of worldly views and influences, the Lord has created a sanctuary where the believer can remain safe. The believer is fully trusting in God which keeps him safe from all of these influences. The Lord helps those who trust in Him remain safe from influences as long as they remain fully trusting in Him. In addition to this characteristic, there is one final characteristic left of the Lord as a shepherd.

The sixth characteristic of the Lord that is portrayed is that the Lord is a home. This characteristic is shown in verse six which states, "Surely goodness and lovingkindness will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever" (Psalm 23:6). The sheep that remain in the presence of their shepherd will always remain safe from harm. These sheep must however not wonder off if they want to continue receiving the blessings of the shepherd (Cloer 309).

The believer is stating that he wants all of what he has experienced with the Lord to continue forever. The word "lovingkindness" is that of God's covenant love. This is the type of love that He was showing throughout the Psalm. The believer wants this to continue. He makes a statement that he "will remain in the house of the Lord forever." When one is fully trusting in the Lord, then the Lord will be his or her shepherd and show the same lovingkindness to them. The Lord is a home for those who fully trust in Him.

There have been six characteristics that have been looked at regarding the Lord. By looking at the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm, one can come to understand to fully trust in the Lord. Also, one can realize all of the blessings and care that come when that full trust is shown. This study has helped to better look at the kindness that God portrays upon those who trust in him. He is a shepherd to His children.


